

ACT 046

Purpose & Goals

Expand the capacity, resources, affordability, and flexibility of child care facilities licensed by DHS to significantly increase affordable and accessible child care choices for Hawai'i's families. Especially those in financial need and in lesser-served areas of the State.



Expand the capacity, early learning, and availability of public pre-kindergarten.



Offset cost of living by subsidizing both child care and preschool.




Clarify the coordination of the continuum of early learning and preschool programs.



Build the infrastructure and develop the resources necessary to achieve the objective of providing the capacity to serve 50% of all otherwise unserved children who are 3 and 4 years of age by 2027, and providing the capacity to serve 100% of those children by 2032.

Supplement, Not Supplant



Successful expansion supplements existing options, not supplants.

The diverse array of options provide unique and comprehensive opportunities for both families and children.

A study in New York demonstrated that expanding public pre-k decreased the overall availability of infant and toddler care.

In a national survey, 73% of parents said it would be a better option for them if pre-k were in a child care program with longer hours.

Priorities

Access is not only about increasing availability. It must incorporate the entirety of the system.

- Partner with DOE to expand EOEL public pre-k program and Head Start options;
- Collaborate with the SFA and DHS to support expansion across the sector;
- Support workforce initiatives;
 - Early Childhood Stipend Program
 - ECE3 Study
- Establish a data governance program to collect, standardize, analyze and share data

School Facilities Authority

Act 72

§302A-C Powers; generally. (a) Except as otherwise 12 limited by this chapter, the agency shall be responsible for all 13 public school development, planning, and construction related to 14 capital improvement projects assigned by the legislature, 15 governor, or board of education. The agency shall act as its 16 procurement officer.

Act 217

1. The purpose of this Act is to rename the school facilities agency to the school facilities authority and clearly describe the powers and responsibilities of the school facilities authority and its school facilities authority board, executive director, and administrative staff by amending part VI, subpart C, chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Act 257

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$200,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for the school facilities authority to expand access to pre-kindergarten to eligible children of the State. The school facilities authority may expend the moneys appropriated in this section on:

- (1) The construction of new school facilities;
- (2) The renovation, improvement, and expansion of existing school facilities to increase pre-kindergarten student capacity; and
- (3) Any other costs the school facilities authority deems appropriate to increase pre-kindergarten student capacity within the State.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the school facilities authority for the purposes of this Act; provided that the appropriation authorized by this Act shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal biennium for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

SECTION 2. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2022.

Title I Opportunities

Title I funds can be used for HIDOE preschools

- Students admitted into the preschool must be identified as 'most at risk of failing to meet the state's academic standards based on multiple, educationally related, objective criteria'
- Certain children are automatically eligible to participate in Title I preschool programs: Homeless students, students in community day programs neglected or delinquent children, etc.

Title I District Pilot

Title I funds for Local Education Agencies can be set aside for District Title I Preschools

Pilot Complex Area Preschools will be determined by data

Housed in one school in complex area

Common assessment/survey used to determine eligible students

Admits preschool students from the complex area boundaries


ECE (prek - 3rd grade) Teacher Licensure Programs

- ➡ Dual Preparation BEd in ECE/Elementary: Graduates can obtain a PK 3rd grade and a K-6th grade generalist initial license; face-to-face program on Oahu
- ⇒ Blended BEd in ECE/Special Education: Graduates can obtain both PK- 3rd generalist and special education initial licenses; statewide hybrid (online and face- to- face)
 - Many students enter the program already working with children in public or private child care, preschools and elementary schools who are living in their communities
- ➡ Through our Masters in ECE program: PK-3rd generalist initial license and add-a field; statewide hybrid
 - Most students are existing public and private sector teachers who living in their communities

- Supported by the tuition stipend program







Early Childhood Educator Compensation Equity Study and Roadmap

- Commissioned RAND Corporation from Nov. 1, 2021 to August 2022
- Goals are:
 - 1) to better understand early childhood educator wages, benefits, working conditions, recruitment, training and turnover in the community-based programs; and
 - 2) to accelerate efforts to increase compensation for qualified early childhood educators



Early Care and Education Apprenticeships Pilot

- Early Care and Education apprenticeship program is a holistic "earn-while-you-learn" residency ECE training program, pairing on-the-job learning with coaching, mentoring, and related technical instruction
- Apprentices move along a career pathway as they earn credentials/degrees, earning higher pay at each step
- Piloting with two community-based programs and Honolulu Community College
